

From the Pastor's Desk . . .



I don't know about you, but we spent a good portion of our evenings in February riveted to our television screen, fascinated by all things Winter Olympics. Whenever the Olympics roll around, winter or summer, this seems to happen; we

think that we'll tune in, off and on, check out a few of the big events, and then before we know it we're overly invested in how the German women did in biathlon. It's hard not to get caught up in it, the excitement, the tension, the stories that are yet to be written, the history that is potentially being made, the young kids becoming stars, the stars who are giving it one last go, there's always something that can pull you in, whether you want to be pulled in or not. However, there's one thing that always remains consistent for me through the Olympics, and that is my propensity to be amazed, fascinated, and somewhat terrified by what these athletes willingly put their bodies through, all for the sake of gold.

Every Olympic cycle, I am blown over again and again by the things that people have convinced their bodies, their minds to do, because sometimes it doesn't seem possible, let alone sane or safe. I mean look at something like...the skeleton. Number one, who wants to participate in a sport named after bones? Number two, who thinks it's even remotely safe to hurl yourself down an icy hill, head first, with nothing but your own feet for brakes? At one point, when one of our racers skidded a bit on her run, I yelped, full on, out loud yelped. The same goes for ski jumping. When your husband looks at you and says, "It sounds like a jet taking off when they go down the hill," that doesn't seem like a sport you want to participate in! Don't even get me started on the slopestyle snowboarding and skiing. They were my favorite competitions this year, but you could not pay me to hurl myself up in the air and see how many times I can twist my body around and somehow land safely on my feet (sometimes

backwards!). It takes an immense amount of training to do these things, but it also takes an immense amount of trust, of faith, for our athletes to go out there and put it all out on the ice and the snow, with little assurance that it will be ok, beyond their own skills and the weather conditions.

As I was watching this year, it got me thinking... what if we put into our faith the same kind of trust that our athletes put into their sports? And no, I'm not saving that this means we should go hurtling down hills at insane speeds all with the blind trust that God has got our backs; what I'm saying is, the life of faith that God calls us to is in some ways just as scary, just as frightening as a skeleton track. God calls us to go out into the world and love people, all people. God calls us to lead lives that are countercultural, seeking to focus on the good of others, to not live with hearts full of judgment, prejudice, and fear, to strive for the good of all rather than just the good of ourselves, and let's face it, that is no easy task. Far too often, I think one of the things that gets in the way of our leading fully authentic lives of faith is fear. Fear of the unknown, fear of uncertainty, fear of failure, fear of getting our hearts broken, fear of making others upset, fear, fear, fear.

Fear is not what is going to bring the kingdom of God to earth. Fear of our neighbor, fear of saying the unpopular thing, that isn't going to help us live into the greatest commandment that we have, to love our neighbor as God loves us. Is it possible that what we need in order to live into this earthly kingdom of heaven is a little bit of Olympic athlete trust? Is it possible that what we need to live out our faith is a little bit of Olympic insanity that says, yup, I'm going to hurl myself down that hill? Does it mean that everything will go smoothly? Does it mean that every chance on faith that we take will be a gold medal run? No. There are no such guarantees in life, even in a life of faith, however, does it mean that we will know that we gave it our all in trying to help God's kingdom come? Does it mean that we will know that at the end of the day we

gave more love than apathy? That we trusted more than we feared? That we strove for peace more than division? That we sought God's kingdom more than our own? I think it would.

We have a few more weeks of Lent left to go and I pray that those weeks might be characterized for you by a little bit of Olympic oomph. That you might look at your faith, your life with God, and decide that it's time to go down that hill, as fast as you can, because, well, isn't it worth taking that chance?

Reformation Concert Series: Christopher Young in Recital

Christopher Young is Professor of Music at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, Bloomington, Indiana. He teaches applied organ and several graduate organ literature history courses for the organ department. Dr. Young, a native of New England, was the winner of the 1988 National Young Artists Competition of The American Guild of Organists as well as of the 1988 Arthur Poister Competition (Syracuse University). He was also recognized by Musical America as one of their outstanding

Young Artists of 1989. His concert career was begun under the auspices of a special young artist program provided by Karen McFarlane Artists, and continued under the Young Organists Cooperative, of which he was a co-director until 1993. Dr. Young has been a featured artist at national and regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists. He has also been heard on Minnesota Public Radio's "Pipedreams," a program broadcast on National Public Radio, and has appeared in concert with the Rochester (MN) Chamber Chorale, the Minneapolis Chamber Symphony and with his wife, violinist Brenda Brenner. His compact disc To Thee All Angels Cry Aloud was recorded on the Pro Organo label. In addition to concertizing, Dr. Young presents master classes, workshops and lectures. He has given classes and performances at several church music clinics, including the Montreat Conference on Music and Worship, the St. Olaf Conference on Music and Theology, and the national convention of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. He has also presented at several National Pedagogy Conferences, as well national and regional conventions of the AGO. Several presentations have focused on electronic media, including a virtual tour of North German Organs, interactive analyses of organ music, and the theoretical underpinnings to the organ music of Messiaen. Dr. Young serves as organist of First Presbyterian Church, Bloomington. Dr. Young began organ lessons under the tutelage of Marion Anderson while a freshman at Bates College in Lewiston, ME, where, in 1982 he graduated Phi Beta Kappa with High Honors in Music. A graduate of The Eastman School of Music, he earned the MM and DMA degrees, and the prestigious Performer's Certificate under David Craighead and Russell Saunders.
