

From the Pastor's Desk . . .

I'm not sure how much we think about it, the Sabbath, and even if we do think about it, I'm not sure how much we think about it as a gift. The command to "remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy," wasn't just some random idea from God to the Israelites because God wanted to keep their worship life in rhythm. I mean, that was part of it, but it wasn't all of it. For a newly formed community that is now wandering in the wilderness for an undisclosed number of years, God does try to give them some guidelines to keep their lives, particularly their religious life, in rhythm. Calling them to take intentional time for worship would help them find a schedule, a pattern to living, it would help them feel like a people, God's people in particular. Yet, it was so much more than that, if it wasn't God wouldn't have gone on and on and on about all the people and creatures that were to participate in the Sabbath. God says that this isn't just a day for the Israelites, it's a day for their livestock, for every member of their households, for children, for every living creature, a day set aside for worship and...for rest.

In today's go, go, go world, that very word, rest, is almost laughable. Who has time to rest anymore? There's always something to do, somewhere to be, how on earth do you find time to rest? There is no room in my iPhone calendar for rest. I'm booked up from here until Christmas, I'll sleep then, but probably not. We have become a distinctly anti-Sabbath culture. It's gotten so bad apparently that before I left for the office this morning, there was a story on the news about a New York congressman proposing a bill that would make it illegal to answer work emails or for bosses to call their employees outside of work hours. That's the point we're at... we need to make working at certain hours against the law so that people can take a deep breath and rest. Sure on the face of it, you read something like that and you laugh and think this is crazy, but then if you really thought about your day, your life...what would it look like if we stopped for a few hours every night or even a few hours a week and just sabbathed? My

guess is, for a few days we'd be a bit more stressed because we'd spend all that time thinking WHAT COULD I BE DOING IF I WASN'T RESTING?! But then I think we might find the solace and the peace God was intending when this was first made a commandment. We might find God, we might find each other, we might find life renewed.

So, my dear siblings in Christ, I issue you a challenge for this Easter season...take the Sabbath seriously. Find some time for you, for you and God, in whatever way, shape, or form that you need, and it doesn't just have to be on Sunday! Just find some time. Make sabbathing an art this Easter season. I don't know about you, but Lent was a lot this year. It was heavy and busy and a bit chaotic and I am ready for Easter. I am ready for a season of new life, of peace, of breathing in (hopefully) warmer air and giving thanks for the day that the Lord has made. Easter is a season we need, as a reminder of the amazing gift of life with God, as a reminder of the amazing gift of life with our families and our friends, as a reminder of the amazing gift of life. Maybe you make it a family adventure, to pick one thing a week that you're going to do to Sabbath. It can be as simple as you're going to have a no technology night, pop some popcorn and watch a movie. Maybe you take the dog on an extended walk together. Maybe you all go to Barnes and Noble and pick out a new book to enjoy together. Maybe you pick a day to call a family member who is out of town and really talk with them. It could be any number of things, and it can look however you want, that is the joy of the Sabbath after all, that it looks like whatever it takes for you to reconnect with God, your breath, and your life for a time. It is a gift, this Sabbath thing that we've been given, and while it might not fit inside any Easter baskets, it's still pretty miraculous.

Enjoy this time dear hearts, it is God given and it is precious. Rest, breathe, take your time, God's by your side for the journey.

Trinity Reformation Celebration Music Event



Trinity's year-long celebration of the Lutheran Reformation's 500th anniversary continues on the morning of Sunday, April 22nd. Dr. Jacquelyn Matava will visit to perform Bach's *Gott soll allein mein Herze haben*, BWV 169. You may recall soprano Rainelle Krause's visit last spring to sing another of Bach's cantatas, *Jauchzet Gott in allen Landen*, BWV 51. This year's offering differs in instrumentation:

instead of trumpet, you'll hear oboes, English horn, and strings, all from the Virginia Symphony Orchestra. Trinity's chancel choir will participate as well.

Get to know Jackie: Praised for her "warm, soothing legato line", American mezzo-soprano Jacquelyn Matava has performed extensively throughout the United States, and has been heard as a soloist in England, Spain, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, and Venezuela.

An accomplished concert artist, Jacquelyn has been heard as a soloist in performances of Bach's Mass in B minor, Duruflé's Requiem, Handel's *Messiah*, Mozart's "Great" Mass in C minor, and Stravinsky's *Les Noces.* In 2014, she performed at the Lucerne Festival in Switzerland under the baton of Sir Simon Rattle. She has sung with the Tanglewood Music Center, Lucerne Festival Academy, Opera San Antonio, Alamo City Opera, Opera Saratoga, San Antonio Choral Society, Bloomington Chamber Singers, IU Summer Music Festival, Columbus Indiana Philharmonic, Danbury Music Centre, Masterworks Chorale (IL), and Hudson Valley BachFest.


