From the Pastor's Desk



IT'S ALMOST CHRISTMAS!!! I'm sure this has been the refrain in some of your households for as long as it's been one in mine. Ben faithfully starts cranking the Christmas music come November 1, despite my own

adamant refusal to turn the holly jolly on until Black Friday. It feels like these days it starts even before Halloween. I will be completely honest that I get a little annoyed at the early Christmas jubilation when it starts hitting in October, mostly because Hallmark Channel starts running Christmas movies non-stop and that means no more Golden Girls reruns until January, but that's probably my own unique grievance with the desire to rush Christmas here. I don't know there's just something about wanting to rush to Christmas that is tough, because by rushing to the 25th of December we miss so much in between. We miss Halloween, we miss the joy and lead up to Thanksgiving, we miss the steady incoming of cooler weather that brings its own kind of enjoyment, and most importantly, we tend to miss Advent.

Far too often, Advent becomes that thing we just have to get through in order to get to Christmas. Maybe we have our Advent calendars and we enjoy our tiny piece of chocolate everyday to help us countdown the days, but somehow we still end up missing the intentionality of Advent. We forget that Advent is meant to be a bit like Lent. We go through the intentional walk of the forty days leading up to Easter so well. Some of us give up things, some of us take up things, we have midweek services, we bury the alleluia, all so that when Easter morning comes it dawns just a bit brighter. We've walked the path to get to Easter morning and once you're there it makes you appreciate your Lenten journey just a shade more. That's what Advent is supposed to be too. It's supposed to be an

intentional time of thought, reflection, prayer, and anticipation so that when Christmas gets here, CHRISTMAS GETS HERE! And it's a wondrous rush of light and hope and peace and amazement, because we've been waiting so long and so patiently and thank goodness the Christ child is born. Yet, that's rarely how we feel on Christmas. Sometimes we've spent so much time rushing to Christmas that when it gets here we're either too exhausted to breathe it in or we've been in the Christmas mood so long already we're kind of done the second it arrives. We miss Christmas when it gets here because we've spent all of Advent already Christmas-ing.

So, in an effort to slow a little bit, to take some intentional time to prepare for Christmas, to get into our Advent shoes, we have a couple of daily practices that we're going to be launching once Advent officially starts on December 2. They're small things, but they're intentional things, ways in which we can take a few moments out of the day to think about the journey we're on and just what it is we're preparing for.

The first of these things is going to be called: "Preparing the Way through Prayer." Every day there will be something different for you to pray for and reflect on. We'll have the list available for you below, as well as in the bulletin throughout Lent. I'll also be accompanying each day with a tiny reflection video on Facebook, which will be part of my own intention to be purposeful in my Advent preparations this year.

The second thing we'll be doing is called: "Picturing the Way." We did this on a small scale this year, but what it is is an Advent Photo-a-Day challenge. Each day of Advent will be paired with a word that highlights a certain facet of our faith lives and our Advent journey. You are invited to snap a picture every day of something that reflects that day's word. For example, if the word of the day is love, you could post a picture of your kids or your dog or something that happened during your day that reflects love. Post your pictures to the church's Facebook page, as well as on your own personal page or on Instagram and tag them with #trinitylutheran and #picturingtheway that way we can all find the pictures and collect them into one big album on the church's Facebook page.

Each of these projects is designed to get you and your family thinking more deeply about Advent and how we prepare for Christ's arrival on Christmas. John the Baptist calls us to prepare the way of the Lord, and these are just a couple of small ways we can think differently about Advent and our journey to Christmas. We all prepare in different ways, but

Mark your calendars! On Sunday, December 9th, after the second service we will decorate our sanctuary for Christmas. We call this the "greening of the church." We need the more agile in our congregation, those not afraid of heights and ladders, to hang greenery and wreaths and to take down the globes from our chandeliers. (It's time to wash them.) We need those with strong muscles to carry the trees from the blower room downstairs and set them up – making sure all lights are working. For those who like to keep their feet on the ground, the greenery and wreaths need to be "fluffed" before hanging, and the bows need to be tied on.

The youth have the responsibility for decorating the trees with Chrismons, those white and gold ornaments, symbols of Christianity. As the youth know, this is not an easy job. These ornaments are breakable so they must be handled with care and arranged on the tree in a certain pattern. The symbols on the front of the tree form a figure 8. The upper loop of the 8 is formed with ornaments which show God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit while the lower loop contains symbols for the seasons of the church year.

As you help with the decorating or just enjoy the decorated trees, see if you can find the Advent Chrismon. In Isaiah 9:6 we read "For a child has been born for us, a son given to us. . . and he is named Prince of Peace." So the Advent Chrismon is a

The days are surely coming, but they will come in their own time, so let's not rush it, let's enjoy the anticipation and all that comes before Christmas finally arrives.

Our 7:30 service on Christmas Eve will be accompanied by Noah Klein, an accomplished undergraduate at Indiana University. Noah has been hard at work preparing new repertoire for his visit to Trinity, where he'll accompany the congregation and choir, gaining valuable

real-world experience as he develops skills for a career in music. As you know, Trinity is committed to encouraging the next generation of church musicians - think of our music internship and the Don Golden Scholarship at Christopher Newport University - and Noah's visit is the next logical step in that commitment. His biography follows: From Northfield, Minnesota, Noah Klein began studying the piano at age 6 and the organ at age 11. He began accompanying church services at age 15. Following high school graduation, Noah attended school and lived with a host family for one year in South Korea as part of the Rotary Youth Exchange program. He currently is a Premier Young Artist Scholar at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music where he studies organ performance with Dr. Janette Fishell. Noah serves as the music intern at Tabernacle Presbyterian Church in Indianapolis.

Noah will offer an extended prelude prior to the 7:30 pm service, including works by Johannes Brahms, Dieterich Buxtehude, Paul Manz, Johann Pachelbel, and Johann Sebastian Bach's Canonic Variations on Vom Himmel hoch, Martin Luther's quintessential Christmas hymn. 
Worship and Music: Flower Ministry
