
Let us confess our sin, trusting in the abundant grace of God.





Prayer of the Day

Everlasting God, you give strength to the weak and power to the faint. Make us agents of your healing and wholeness, that your good news may be made known to the ends of your creation, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

First Reading: Isaiah 40:21-31

The Judeans in exile have a good reason to be hopeful: the one who will bring them to freedom is the God who created the world, the God who subdues the rulers of the earth and gives strength to those who are weary.

Have you not known? Have you not heard?
Has it not been told you from the beginning?
Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?
It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers;
who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in;
who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing.

Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when he blows upon them, and they wither, and the tempest carries them off like stubble.

To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One. Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing. Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God"? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

Psalm 147:1-11, 20c (read responsively)

Hallelujah! How good it is to sing praises to our God! How pleasant it is to honor God with praise!
The Lord rebuilds Jerusalem, and gathers the exiles of Israel.
The Lord heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds.
The Lord counts the number of the stars and calls them all by their names. Great is our Lord and mighty in power; there is no limit to God's wisdom.

The Lord lifts up the lowly,

but casts the wicked to the ground.

Sing to the Lord with thanksgiving; make music upon the harp to our God,

who covers the heavens with clouds

and prepares rain for the earth, making grass to grow upon the mountains.
God provides food for the cattle and for the young ravens when they cry.
God is not impressed by the might of a horse,

and has no pleasure in the speed of a runner,

but finds pleasure in those who fear the Lord,

in those who await God's steadfast love. Hallelujah!

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

Paul is concerned about the way some Corinthian Christians use their freedom in Christ as license to engage in non-Christian behavior that sets a damaging example to other, impressionable believers. Christians have a responsibility to each other that their behavior does not cause another to sin.

If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel.

For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though I myself am not under the law) so that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law) so that I might win those outside the law. To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings.

Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

Everywhere Jesus goes, many people expect him to set them free from oppression. Everywhere he goes, he heals people and sets them free. Disease, devils, and death are running for their lives. The forces that diminish human life are rendered powerless by Jesus.

The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the 1st chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

As soon as [Jesus and the disciples] left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." He answered, "Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.



Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021: You've probably been wondering how in the world we are going to observe Ash Wednesday as a church family in this time of social distancing and minimal contact living. Well, the answer is...we're going to have a lot of options for you.

Option 1: Worship via Facebook Live at 6:30 with virtual distribution of ashes

Beginning on Sunday, February 14, there will be small packets of ashes for you to pick up in the church lobby that will contain instructions for how to appropriately prepare your ashes for distribution at home during worship. You can place your ashes personally on your own forehead, or distribute them as a family. We will take intentional time during worship that evening for ash distribution, so if you choose to pick up a packet, be sure to save them and have them prepped for worship that evening.

Option 2: Drive-Up Ashes 9:15-10:00 & 12:15-1:00

We will have two 45 minute slots of time on Ash Wednesday where you are welcome to come to church to receive your ashes and participate in a brief carside liturgy with Pastor Tina, much like we do for drive-thru communion. You will remain in your car, fully masked, and Pastor Tina will administer ashes in full PPE from as safe a distance as possible using a non-contact method. (I know you're wondering how that's possible. The answer? Qtips!!!)

In order for us to determine timing for the drive up options we would ask that you **RSVP by February 11, to the church office, if you plan to attend either of the time slots listed above.**

Lenten Wednesdays: Created for Community: Even if we can't gather together for a meal and conversation in person, doesn't mean we can't still gather together on the Wednesday evenings of Lent. Every Wednesday evening throughout the Lenten season we will gather via Zoom at 6:30 p.m. for worship and conversation. Each week we will focus on a different form of community that we participate in. There will be time for prayer, scripture, small group conversation, and time to reflect as a community together. It will be a chance for us to see each other during worship and talk and share time and faith reflections, so that even as we have to be apart we can walk our Lenten journey together.
