# CONGREGATIONAL VISIONING WITH PASTOR JOHN WIRTZ

#### Congregational Visioning for the Future

John Wertz, Assistant to the Bishop and Director of Evangelical Mission for the Virginia Synod to participate in a workshop designed to ask us as a congregation: what does our future look like? The conversation is going to be centered around our passions as a community, what we do well, and how we can transform those passions and gifts into a plan for the future.

There can be no denying that we have changed as a congregation since 2020. Every congregation has, but in order for us to move forward and build from where we are, we have to ask what we want to build, and the only way we can ask that is if you are present. It is paramount that as many members of the congregation as possible are present for this conversation so that we are making sure we're hearing from all of us.

# Dear Martin by Nic Stone

Justyce McAllister is top of his class and set for the Ivy League – but none of that matters to the police officer who just put him in handcuffs. And despite leaving his rough neighborhood behind, he can't escape the scorn of his former peers or the ridicule of his new classmates. Justyce looks to the teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. for answers. But do they hold up anymore? He starts a journal to Dr. King to find out.

Then comes the day Justyce goes driving with his best friend, Manny, windows rolled down, music turned up—way up, sparking the fury of a white off-duty cop beside them. Words fly. Shots are fired. Justyce and Manny are caught

in the crosshairs. In the media fallout, it's Justyce who is under attack.

## Dear Justyce by Nic Stone

Shortly after teenager Quan enters a not guilty plea for the shooting death of a police officer, he is placed in a holding cell to await trial. Through a series of flashbacks and letters to Justyce, the protagonist of Dear Martin, Quan's story unravels.

From a troubled childhood and bad timing to a coerced confession and prejudiced police work, Nic Stone's newest novel takes an unflinching look at the flawed practices and ideologies that discriminate against African American boys and minorities in the American justice system.
